TIP **FORM:** Complete the following sentences in their conditional form with the verb **work**.

Three Types of Conditional Sentences

Meaning of the If clause	verb form in the If clause Condition	verb form in the main clause Result	Example
First Conditional true in the present/ future	simple present	simple present OR simple future	If I work today, I (not) won't work tomorrow.
Second Conditional untrue in the present/future	simple past	would + simple verb form	If I worked today, I (not) wouldn't work tomorrow.
Third Conditional untrue in the past	past perfect (had + past participle)	would have + past participle	If I had worked yesterday, I (not) wouldn't have worked today.

STEP 3: Controlled and Communicative Exercises

EXERCISE 1: Complete the following sentences with the corresponding **conditional form**. Then, ask your tutor the questions.

- 1. (first conditional)** If I (**have**) *have* a day off, I (**go**) *will go* to the museum.
 - Where will you go if you have a day off?
- 2. (first conditional)** We (**go, not**) *won't go* hiking if the rain (**persist**) *persists*.
- Will you go hiking if it rains?
- 3. (second conditional)** If she (**be**) *were* bilingual, she (**get**) *would get* better job offers.
 - Would you get better job offers if you were bilingual?
- 4. (second conditional)** I (**change**) *would change* a few things in my life if I (**can**) *could* turn back time.
 - Would you change anything in your life if you could turn back time?
- 5. (third conditional)** If he (**study**) *had studied* harder, he (**pass**) *would have passed* the math course.
 - If you had studied harder, would you have passed all your courses or got better marks?
- 6. (third conditional)** If you (**be-born**) *had been born* 100 years ago, your life (**be**) *would have been* different.
 - If you had been born 100 years ago, how would your life have been different?

EXERCISE 2: Complete the following **conditional sentences** in your own words.

E.g. If I graduate from college, I will go to university next year.

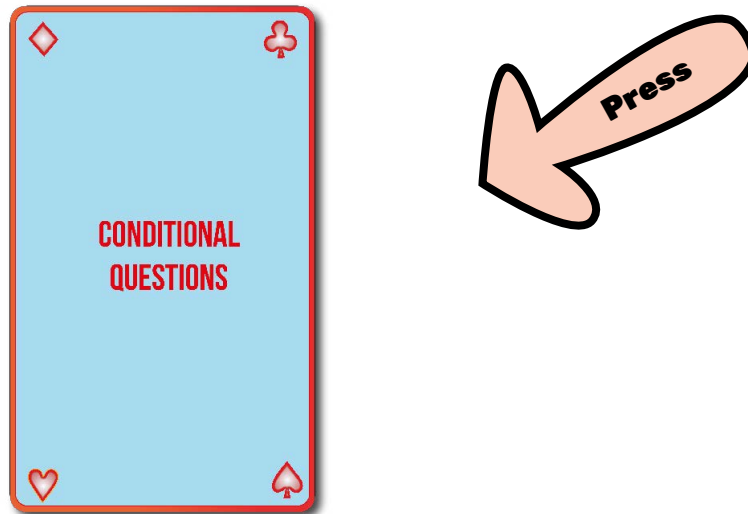
1. If I don't sleep well, *I (future or simple present)*
2. If I have to work on the weekend, *I (future or simple present)*
3. If I were a bird, *I (would + base form)*
4. If I lived in a foreign country, *I (would + base form)*
5. If I had known when I was young what I know today, *I (would have + past participle)*
6. If I had been born in a foreign country, *I (would have + past participle)*

Three Types of Conditional Sentences - Theory

First Conditional true in the present / future	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If I work today, I don't work tomorrow. • If I work today, I won't work tomorrow.
Second Conditional untrue in the present /future	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If I worked today, I wouldn't work tomorrow.
Third Conditional untrue in the past	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If I had worked today, I wouldn't have worked yesterday.
Third Conditional untrue in the past	past perfect (had + past participle)
	would have + past participle
	If I <i>had worked</i> yesterday, I (not) <i>wouldn't have worked</i> today.
