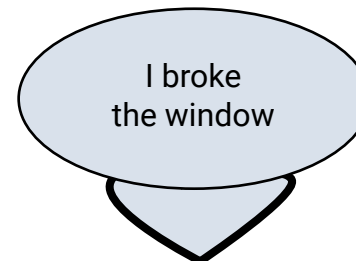
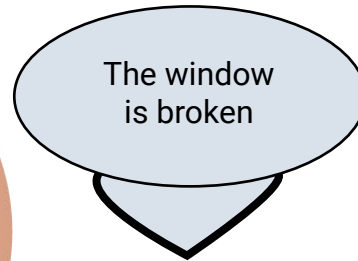

Tense	Active Voice	Passive Voice
Simple present	I make a mistake.	A mistake (by someone).
	He makes mistakes.	Mistakes (by someone).
Present progressive	He is making a mistake.	(by someone).
Simple past	He made a mistake.	(by someone).
Future/modals	He will make a mistake.	(by someone).
Present perfect	He has made a mistake.	(by someone).

TIP

Active Voice versus Passive Voice - Form		
Tense	Active Voice	Passive Voice
Simple Present	I made a mistake. He makes mistakes	A mistake is made. Mistakes are made.
Present Progressive	He is making a mistake	A mistake is being made.
Simple past	He made a mistake.	A mistake was made.
Future/Modals	He will make a mistake.	A mistake will be made.
Present Perfect	He has made a mistake.	A mistake has been made.

How do you make an active voice sentence into a passive voice sentence?

How do you make an active voice sentence into a passive voice sentence?		
	Active Voice Sentence: The mechanic discovered the problem.	
Tense	Step 1. Identify the object of the active sentence and make it into the subject of the passive sentence.	The problem (object) = subject of the passive sentence
Simple present	Step 2. Form the passive voice verb: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • BE + past participle of the main verb Note: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • make sure the verb BE agrees with the new subject • use the same verb tense as in the active sentence 	Was + discovered
Present progressive		
Simple past	Step 3. Add the BY + doer (if necessary).	by the mechanic
Future/modals	Passive Voice Sentence: The problems was discovered by the mechanic.	
Present perfect	He has made a mistake.	(by someone).

Passive Voice - Use
