EXERCISE 1: Highlight the keyword(s). Then, fill in the blanks with the correct form of the verb in parentheses. Use present perfect or simple past tenses.

- 2. Have you ever (be) been caught in a bad snowstorm?
 - · Ask me if I have ever been caught in a snowstorm.
- 3. What time (come) did vou come to school yesterday?

EXERCISE 3: Make questions in the present perfect or simple past using the cues.

STEP 4: Production task

EXERCISE 4: Play Liar, Liar.

*You will need: scrap paper and a pencil to keep score.

Instructions: Conjugate the verbs in parentheses. Then, ask the tutor the question. The response must be in the present perfect affirmative.

E.g. "Yes, I have broken a bone."

Then, the tutee will ask a follow-up question to see if they are telling the truth.

E.g. Which bone did you break?

If the tutee spots a lie, they get the point. If the tutor has not lied or the lie goes undetected, the tutor gets the point.

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
