
A Typical Sunday for John

- Ask me if I wake up late on Sunday. Do you wake up late on Sunday?



- Ask me what my favourite breakfast is. What is your favourite breakfast?
- Ask me what my father likes to eat for breakfast. What does your father like to eat...?
- How often do you eat eggs and bacon for breakfast? I eat



- Who does John watch TV with? He watches TV with his girlfriend.
- Who do you usually watch TV with? I usually watch TV with...
- Ask me who my mother watches TV with. Who does your mother watch TV with?
- Ask me what my favourite TV show is. What is your favourite TV show?

- What video games do you like to play? I like to play ...
- Ask me what video games my father likes to play. What video games does your father like to play?
- Ask me if Fortnite is my favourite video game. Is Fortnite your favourite video game?
- What does John hate to do on Sunday? He hates to do his homework.
- What do you hate to do? I hate to...
- Ask me what my best friend hates to do. What does your best friend hate to do?
- Ask me what homework I like to do. What homework do you like to do?


STEP 4: Production Task

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


Step-by-Step Question Formation Chart
